# THE BURIAL OF OLD BIGGIN HILL'ITE, DAVID PORTER'S ASHES

David, who in recent times lived up in Northeast England for many years, sadly passed away on 20<sup>th</sup> December 2022 at age 90.

The service we organised for the 5<sup>th</sup> August (as publicised in the last Newsletter) was attended by David's children, Elizabeth, Kim, and Charles, plus myself and a few more old friends of David from those early years.... The actual service was carried out by the Chapel's Reverend Alison Newman, who is also the Vicar for the St Mark's Church in the village (often known as the Moving Church of course!)

An excellent way of showing our support of David and saying goodbye to our old friend from all those years ago....

#### **DAVID QUIRK**

Looking back to the early days of Biggin Hill Airport, many of us oldies will remember well our old friend David Quirk, who was a flying instructor with various clubs, in particular Flairavia Flying Club, which was owned by David Porter (see above). He also eventually started and ran his own Training club at Biggin with Paul Shires, which was called QS Aviation.

I was trying from the Monday 19<sup>th</sup> July to make contact with him, to let him know about the memorial and ashes burial event planned for the 5<sup>th</sup> August for his old boss. I couldn't establish contact with him or his partner, Barbara, but left a few messages on the phone to try to get a call back. Then, on the Friday just before the Memorial gathering, I got a call from Barbara who told me that on the previous Monday David had suffered a couple of small strokes. On the following day, he was suffering more, so he was admitted to Hospital at the PRU to keep him under check....

Barbara did then say that, although it was not certain, it was probable that he may be allowed home after that weekend, where he would need some care staff to assist.

He is, apparently, fairly good and communicative, but had some leg problems and therefore was finding standing and walking very difficult, meaning he would have to remain on the ground floor at home. He was also suffering from very poor hearing, so would find it difficult to communicate with us all.....,

It was, of course, a serious injury, but after two years of regular neurological brain scans, and lots of medical assessments, I was luckily allowed to obtain my aviation medical back and return to instructing.

So this year's five year anniversary was a most amazing event for me, and of course my family and friends.. Thanks everyone for your support....

#### SEPTEMBER BIGGIN HILL POSTED FUEL PRICES

The "posted" Biggin Hill Airport fuel prices, <u>excluding VAT</u>, for the calendar month of September 2024 are:

£1:77.0 per litre for 100LL Avgas if supplied from the Fuel Bowser (if uplifted using <u>fuel account card Only</u> from the Self-Refuel pumps = minus 5p per litre – and an additional 1p per litre off if also paid by Direct Debit)

£0:83.4 per litre for Jet A1 (Sustainable Aviation Fuel £1:06.9 per litre)

<u>SPECIAL NOTES:</u> Users are advised that <u>credit and debit cards **can no longer** be used at the self-refuel pumps.</u> If you use self-refuelling, you will need your airport H-TEC fuel account card with you when you go there. (if you haven't got one with you, you will have to go over to the Main Terminal apron to uplift fuel from the bowsers instead).

#### **BIGGIN HILL AIRPORT**

As discussed in last month's issue of the Newsletter, Biggin Hill Airport is becoming a seriously busy Corporate Airport close to London, with both small exec jets as regular visitors, but nowadays also quite a steady flow of some of the largest Corporate Jets operating here to and from the USA, Canada, and the Middle and Far East.

It may upset some Biggin Hill'ite oldies, who obviously remember when the airport really only had loads of light aircraft flying, as a result of Croydon Airport closing back in the late 50's.

Some are not overly happy with the relatively obvious ATC restrictions that occasionally apply when the corporate jet traffic is very heavy, but it should be realised that, if it was not for the major Corporate traffic increases, it is almost certain that we would have lost the airport altogether and have all the land becoming a massive housing estate instead!

## MONTHLY NEWS FROM THE CEO's OFFICE

August saw the Airport build on what has been a successful first half of the year, with movements following the same positive trend set in the previous 6 months. This mirrors positive trends across Europe providing evidence of the resilience of business aviation notwithstanding the continuing global instability. That said, the summer of major sporting events has played a significant part in ensuring business aviation has enjoyed a bumper summer period.

The Airport continues its development programme to improve existing infrastructure and improve its service offering to customers. Having installed the new Instrument Runway Visual Range (IRVR) system, which will eventually include 24-hour automated METAR reporting, we are now awaiting an opportunity to complete operational calibration. Work also continues to plan for the runway resurfacing and introduction of centre line lighting in 2025. The Airport will soon start to construct the batching plant that will supply the raw materials for the resurfacing project. The Airport continues to work with a key tenant to progress the Aviation College on site and deliver engineering accommodation.

The Airport continues to focus on engagement with local residents through the Airport Residents Noise Action Forum (ARNAF), established over 10 months to facilitate direct engagement with Resident Associations. The next ARNAF meeting is scheduled for 18th September. A case study focused on Keston, following a similar format to the one undertaken for Tatsfield, is beginning to gain traction and I would ask the community to continue its excellent support in flying in accordance with the NAP.

I would also like to encourage private owners to attend the Light Aviation Steering Group, which was established over 3 years ago to ensure the private pilots had a voice and could engage directly with the Airport on matters concerning the GA community. This is your group and its effectiveness depends on active involvement.

Work continues with the CAA regarding the trial of the new instrument approach to Rwy 03, the removal of dependencies on the VOR DME and the completion of the 21 RNAV overlay. The Airport remains hopeful that the trial of the new 03 instrument approach will take place in the fourth quarter of this year. The Airport is already preparing for simulation and procedure validation flights.

The Airport continues to work hard to roll out the 2nd phase of its Air Quality Monitoring initiative with the installation of additional sensors. The monitors will have an increased number of sensors to detect SO2 (Sulphur Dioxide), NO2 (Nitrogen Dioxide), CO (Carbon Monoxide), VOC (Volatile Organic Compounds) and 03 (Ground Ozone). The sensors will also detect Particulate matter 1, 2.5 and 10 micrograms of solid or liquid particles in the atmosphere. The Airport will be working with the newly formed Airport Residents' Noise Action Forum to see how the Airport might report on Air Quality in the future.
